Step 1: Identify Pain Points

Empathize with the **user** to identify pain points.

Imagine yourself in the user's shoes.

Do the tasks you would expect a user to do.

Speak to the user and ask lots of questions about their experiences.

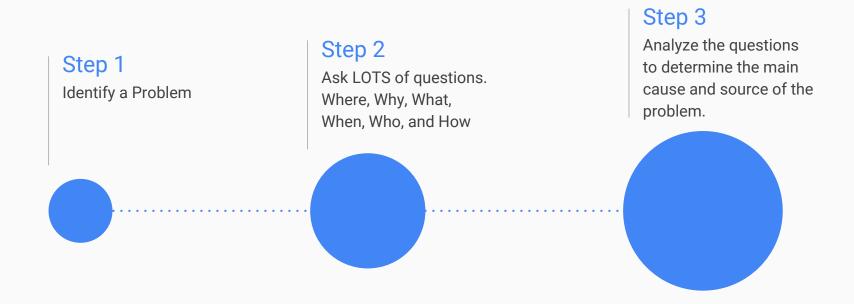
The **user** is a person experiencing a problem in their life.

The problem could be severe, like an illness, or mediocre like sneakers that constantly untie.

Identifying the solution is never as important as identifying the problem.

Getting to the ROOT of a Problem



Example of Getting to the Root of a Problem.

Pain Point: Josh is very tired everyday.

 What are Some Questions You Might Ask?

Example of Getting to the Root of a Problem.

When did you start feeling tired:

Two weeks ago

Who else in your house is tired?

Only my brother who shares my room

Where do you sleep?

In the Basement

What other events changed in your life two weeks ago?

We got a dog

Example of Getting to the Root of a Problem.

It seems that Josh's new dog must be keeping him up at night.

The solution now seems to be about "how to make the dog stop barking at night" instead of "How to make Josh less tired".
