
## פרק א · משנה ה

יוֹסֵי בֶּן יוֹחָנֶן אִישׁ יְרוּשָׁלַיִם אוֹמֵר, יְהִי ביתְךְּ פָּתוּחַ לִּרְוּחָה, וְיִהְיוּ עֲנִיִּים בְּנֵי ביתֶךְ, ואַל תַּרְבֶּה שִׁיחָה עם הָאִשָּׁה. בְּאִשְׁתּוֹ

אָמְרוּ, קַל וחֹמֶר בְּאֵשֶׁת חֲברוֹ. מִכָּאן אָמְרוּ חֲכָמִים, כָּל המַרְבֶּה שִׂיחָה עִם הָאִשָּׁה, גּוֹרֵם רָעָה לְעַצְמוֹ, וּבוֹטֵל מִדְּברֵי תוֹרָה, וסוֹפּוֹ יוֹרֵשׁ גֵּיהִנָּם.

יוֹסֵי בֶּן יוֹחָנִן, a leader of יְרוּשָׁלִיִם said, "Let your home be open wide for guests to come; Employ poor people as members of your household; and, Don't speak excessively with your wife." This last rule is talking about one's own wife, so all the more so about another person's wife. A man who talks too much with women could cause bad things to happen to himself; he will end up wasting time from learning Torah, and could end up in בֵּיהַנְּם (- a place where the *neshamah* is purified if necessary.)



1. The first part of the Mishna discusses hospitality. Some people are selective when it comes to משנה. The משנה is teaching that a person's home should be accessible to <u>all</u> Jews in need!

When one invites only prominent or wealthy people, it may be that he is only doing it in order to receive recognition for himself and not truly giving...

2. The second part of the Mishna teaches us how to give charity in the best way, by giving employment to Jews who are poor.

## Giving someone a job is the highest form of charity.

3. The third part of the משנה doesn't mean that a man shouldn't speak with his wife; it means he shouldn't speak with his wife *excessively*, meaning more than what's necessary. A husband who respects his wife will not waste their time on chit-chat, but with meaningful conversation, care and concern, as the following story illustrates:

Once, Rabbi Aryeh Levin's Rebbetzin felt pain in her foot. They went to the doctor together whereupon the doctor asked, "What can I do for you?" Rabbi Levin answered in all sincerity:

## "Doctor, my wife's foot is hurting us!"
