## **Grade 1 Chai Celebration Project:**

## **Exploring Local Community Heroes**

As part of their unit The Local Community, students divided into groups to meet and interview local heroes – those in our community who were dreamers and brought their dreams to fruition. Each group visited one of the following establishments found in our school's neighbourhood:

- 1) Harbord Bakery
- 2) Ahimsa Yoga
- 3) Home Hardware
- 4) Jaya Wellness Centre
- 5) By the Way Café
- 6) Crepes A-Go-Go

Prior to the interviews, a parent of one of the students in the class who is a writer for a Toronto newspaper, visited the class to share her techniques when conducting interviews.

When groups visited their assigned businesses, interview questions included:

- What inspired you to create this business?
- What skills or training did you have?
- Where there any obstacles you faced?
- Did you have to learn new things?
- What emotions do you feel about your business?
- How do you support the local community?
- Do you have any rules that you need to follow?

What are some of your responsibilities?
Students compared their findings with other groups, according to the topics/questions asked.

After learning about their inspirations, challenges and advice for others, students wrote newspaper articles for their "Chai-lights of the Downtown Jewish Community" newspaper. These collaborative articles were displayed at our Grandparents' and Special Friends' event (see Part 6.)
