Dear 7G,

In Chumash this year, we learned a *sefer* that teaches us how to build an ideal community. Each topic and story that we learned helped us understand the things that an ideal community values.

The concept of ideal communities is not new to you. You each come from inspiring homes and families. Your family is, in a sense, a small community.

Your final Chumash project is to write a letter to the leaders of your family/home community (a.k.a your parents). Your letter must focus on which values from Sefer Bamidbar you felt you already knew how to live by because of the example your parents have set for you at home.

- State the value
- How you learn this value from Sefer Bamidbar
- How you already know and value this because of what your parents have taught you/exemplified for you at home
- Get specific!

Here is an example:

One of the values I learned from Sefer Bamidbar is that true leadership is about giving to others rather than taking from them. When Bnei Yisrael complain for meat, Moshe turns to Hashem. Instead of saying, "I can't do this anymore; these people still disrespect me!" or make the situation about him in any way, Moshe says, "I can't do this anymore; I have nothing to give these people."

Mommy and Daddy, you always go out of your way to make sure that I, and the rest of our family, have everything we need. You give up your Sundays and relaxing time just to be able to give me the opportunity to go to art class. After a long day at work, you take the time to review with me and check in on how life is going. When you make food for Shabbos, it's always the kids' favorites. You give and you give and you give to us. You never ask for anything back.

You must include at least three separate values.

You may write this by hand or on a Chrome Book. You may write separate letters to each of your parents.
